Brief biography: Johannes A. (Jannie) Smit (DLItt) is a graduate of the University of Durban-Westville (now University of KwaZulu-Natal), founding editor of *Alter*nation as peer-reviewed interdisciplinary iournal (1996) and served as research chair of the former Faculty of Humanities at UDW/ UKZN (2000 – 2006). As part of this focus, he assisted numerous young academics to research, write and publish their first academic articles following the peer review process. He is the former Dean and Head of School of the School of Religion, Philosophy and Classics at UKZN, and former President of the Association for the Study of Religion in Southern Africa (two terms). He also served as Acting Dean and Head of School of the School of Arts for one year and three months. His research interests are the History of Systems of Thought/ Knowledge-Power in the Humanities; the Interdisciplinary Digital Humanities in Africa; and Religion and Social Transformation. Topic: Internationalizing South African Scholarly Journals



Brief biography: Ina Smith specialises in the adoption of open science and open access publishing in the global South, with specific emphasis on Africa. She holds a Masters' Degree from the University of Pretoria in Computer Integrated Education, a Higher Education Teaching Diploma, and an Honours Degree in Library and Information Science. She has vast experience working in open access during her employment at the Univ. of Pretoria and Stellenbosch University in repositories, journal publishing and conference publishing. She is currently employed as a planning manager at the Academy of Science of SA, where she is working on a DST/ASSAf/ICSU/CODATA project for an African Open Science Platform. She is also a DOAJ Ambassador for the southern Africa region. In 2014 she received the LIASA President's Acknowledgement for Exceptional Contribution (2014), in 2011 she was a Runner - up in the international EPT Award for Open Access, and in 2016 she was awarded LIASA Librarian of the Year. She has a keen interest in the research process in general, and are actively promoting all to become digital citizens and to remain lifelong researchers and self - learners. Topic: Raising the bar in scholarly publishing: the role of the Academy of Science of South Africa



Brief biography: Susan Veldsman was appointed to the position of Director: Scholarly Publication Unit at the Academy of Sciences in South Africa, in January 2009. She is responsible to drive the Open Science agenda by advocating for the opening up of the entire research process from agenda-setting to the dissemination of findings. Raising the visibility, discoverability and accessibility of South African scholarly journals through Open Access and online journal content management; improve the quality of SA scholarly journal, books & conference proceedings through expert peer review panels in the field; find ways and solutions to further support the development of policy frameworks in order to facilitate optimal use and access to publicly funded research.

She received the Electronic Publishing Trust (EPT) award for her outstanding contribution to the promotion of Open Access in Developing Countries. Early in a career she started off as an Information Librarian, at various Higher Education Libraries in South Africa where she eventually was promoted to Assistant Director: Client Services, Library Services at the University of Johannesburg. During

2002 she moved to a national project, South African National Library and Information Consortium (SANLiC) where she was responsible for negotiating access to commercial databases and was actively involved in promoting Open Access and setting up Institutional Repositories. She continued this work, in 2006, in an international consortium, eIFL.net, in other transitional and developing, member countries worldwide.

Topic: Why publish your science? Who gets to read it?



Brief biography: **Prof. Neil Koorbanally** is an Associate Professor in the School of Chemistry and Physics at the University of KwaZulu-Natal. He is an Organic Chemist by training and holds a Ph.D. from the former University of Natal (2001) and a Masters cum laude (1998) in Organic Chemistry. He was a former Colenso scholar at St. John's College in Cambridge in the United Kingdom in 2005 and is a member of several academic societies such as the Phytochemical Society of Europe, the American Chemical Society and the South African Chemical Institute. He also sits on the editorial board of Natural Products Communications.

His past interests included Natural Products Chemistry and the discovery of lead compounds from plant sources used in traditional medicine. Prof. Koorbanally has discovered compounds with antibacterial activity, sickle cell anaemia, antioxidant properties, anti-inflammatory activity, antimalarial activity and menopausal disorder activity. During his time at Cambridge, he worked on the biosynthetic pathways to the antibiotics butirosin and neomycin under the late Dr Joe Spencer.
