The course reflects the widespread need for isiZulu to be used in education as well as business and commerce, throughout South Africa and in key markets throughout Africa.

The motivation for offering the course is to assist delegates to achieve an appropriate level of language proficiency in isiZulu, which can form the basis for further, more in-depth language study in isiZulu.

## Basic

### How you will benefit. You will learn to:

- Read and translate basic isiZulu phrases to English
- Articulate and write basic isiZulu words, sentences and short phrases
- Listen to and understand spoken isiZulu
- Speak simple isiZulu phrases, including using the correct pronunciation
- Understand the heritage and culture of the Zulu nation

### Modules include:

- Introduction to isiZulu (culture, heritage, context)
- Basic greetings and identity
- Conversational isiZulu
- Reading and writing basic isiZulu words, sentences and short phrases
- Listening to and understanding simple isiZulu phrases

### Who should attend:

Academic and support staff members at UKZN, to fulfill the requirements of the University Language Policy.

### Entrance requirements:

Academic and support staff members at UKZN subject to line management approval prior to registration.

### Programme fee:

The course is funded by UKZN for approved delegates. In addition to this, a non-refundable registration fee of R100 is payable by the delegate before the course begins.

### Duration:

13 sessions - 3 hours (evenings), one session per week over 13 successive weeks (3 months).
